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Board Chair's Message Peter Harrison

As someone once said.... we live in interesting and challenging times!

For many reasons we have certainly been through an interesting year at Alkira - we should feel very proud of the achievements we have made despite the challenges we faced.

In an operating sense, I am delighted to report that we managed to cope in the Covid world to provide services to our participants where we could, either in our premises, in homes or online. The commitment by all our staff to work through the pandemic challenges in the interests of our participants was truly inspiring. On behalf of all in our community, I want to thank them for their dedication. The fact that we had very few Covid cases during the year was a true testament to the way the management team and staff undertook stringent measures to manage the Covid risk.

During the year the Government support through Job Keeper ceased and the management team worked with the Board to ensure we retained as many of our staff despite reduced services to participants. The cost to Alkira of this decision can be seen in the financial reports. The reasoning behind this decision was based on the fact that we needed to focus on retaining our staff for when the lockdowns subsided and we return to "normal" services. This sound decision is now bearing fruit in a job market where hiring skilled staff in the disability field is almost impossible. I am also pleased to note that the demand for our services seems to be high, particularly at Momentum and the Springfield Community Hub, which is further evidence of the importance of the decisions taken during the year.

As you will all be aware during the year, we said goodbye to Lisa Sawatzky as our Chief Executive Officer. During her almost 5-year period as CEO, Lisa made an outstanding contribution to Alkira. Her leadership in making the Springfield Community Hub a reality, through the most difficult times in the transition to the NDIS and throughout the Covid pandemic was truly inspiring. We all wish her well as she enjoys life away from

Unfortunately, the appointment of Richard Dent to succeed Lisa did not work out and we have had both Diane Fitzmaurice and Laura Ubavin acting in the CEO role since late February. In the initial period, Diane worked tirelessly to return full services to our participants as quickly as possible. When Diane stepped down for personal reasons, Laura has continued to implement the plan successfully. As I write this report, I am delighted to advise that we are close to the pre-pandemic service levels at all Alkira sites and seeming to manage Covid cases as they arise. For all of this, I must thank both Diane and Laura for their leadership in difficult times.

From a Board perspective, during the year we said goodbye to Gordon Jacobs, Warrick Mitchell, Arthur Ritchie, and Charlie Xu. After a short period on the Board we also said goodbye to Gemma Tovey. Both Gordon and Warrick were long serving Board members and made significant contributions with their respective legal and property expertise. Whilst Arthur, Charlie and Gemma were on the Board for a shorter period of time, they each made important contributions in what has been a challenging time. During the year we welcomed Brent Sheers and Ron Walker to the Board. You might remember Brent came to us as an observer during 2021 and we were fortunate that he agreed to join our Board. He has recently taken on the role as our Treasurer. We were also delighted to welcome Ron Walker back to the Board after an 18 month "sabbatical". Ron's depth of experience in business and understanding of "all things Alkira" is important as we navigate our way forward. In addition to this we are pleased to continue working with the Observership program in having Katie Bayley join as our Board observer this year.







Over the past couple of months, the Board have been reflecting on the skills we need in the times ahead and we have subsequently updated the Board skills matrix. These results will focus our recruitment activities for new Board members to fill recent vacancies and as current Board members retire.

From a personal viewpoint, I want to thank all on the Board for their help in seeing through these challenging times. Furthermore, I want to thank all in the Alkira community whether they be participants, staff, volunteers or supporters (financial or non-financial) for your contribution in what has been our most challenging of years.

Interim CEO's Message Laura Ubavin

The past year has seen further challenges as we began to learn to live with Covid. Alkira has done an incredible job of delivering safe and adaptable services. Despite Covid we have carried on and achieved great outcomes for the participants we support.

The Challenges

After the opening up of the country following long periods of lockdowns, the disability sector was not immune to the staff shortages that most industries in Australia were experiencing. Finding good talent has been difficult as the labour market was constricting. Although we have done an amazing job collectively at Alkira to minimise the spread of Covid and Influenza, we still have had challenges with roster planning while staff were off sick or isolating. We have been determined not to allow our service delivery to experience significant impact. On some occasions we saw staff fill urgent shifts with only a few hours notice to support the Alkira team and participants. I am so grateful we have such remarkable staff to help us in these uncertain times.

To combat our staff shortages, we have been continually promoting job availabilities to recruit new staff whilst also upskilling current staff and where possible, encouraging staff to work across services. We have also developed mutually beneficial partnerships with training organisations in an effort to gain qualified staff. This has been very successful as we have been able to engage bright and enthusiastic new starters.

Highlights to the year


Despite the challenges I like to focus on the positive outcomes - participants have shown amazing adaptability and were role models of Covidsafe practices in the community. Our dedicated and caring staff have ensured that participants have remained engaged and connected.

Moving Life Art Exhibition

In November, Alkira held its biggest art exhibition with artworks from artists at Momentum, Thurston, Springfield Community Hub, and also some pieces created by participants whilst at home. The exhibition had 37 artists showcasing their work from the last 2 years. It was a very eye catching exhibit with around 80 art works on display made from a range of different mediums such as plasticine sculptures, fabric, watercolour paints, graphic markers and more. We had an intimate closing event for the artists and their families to celebrate this great achievement. Participants talked about their pieces and showed confidence in what they had made. This event was one of the first signs of coming out of lockdown and starting to live with Covid.

Excellence in Business Awards Winner

Alkira won not just one, but two Whitehorse Business Awards! The Whitehorse Excellence in Business Awards celebrate the innovations and contributions of businesses in the local Whitehorse Community. Alkira was awarded the City of Whitehorse Award and Community Award. The City of Whitehorse Award was for Alkira as a whole, the values we represent and everything we do every day. The Community Award nomination focused on the Springfield Community Hub project and recognised the significant challenges faced with completing this impactful community project within a Covid environment. We are humbled to receive both these awards and be acknowledged by the Whitehorse Community. So a big thank you to everyone at Alkira as these awards are for all our combined efforts.



Our new Carer's Network

This year has seen the introduction of the Carer's Network for people who care for a person with a disability. This is a group run by a handful of staff and carers, who meet regularly to socialise, go on outings, share information and to have education sessions. Since its inception it has grown in numbers, and ideas for future events are plentiful.

A focus on sustainability

We were delighted to receive funding from Wheelton Philanthropy and a Federal Government grant for solar panels at Thurston Street. The 60 solar panels are capable of generating 30kwH and this has enabled significant savings to our electricity bills as well as decreasing our carbon footprint. Alkira has been changing its processes to focus more on our environmental impact and to do our part for the community – we have even introduced a sustainability participant program at Thurston Street for participants who are motivated to assist Alkira with minimising our environmental impact.

We should all be pleased with the accomplishments and the resilience that has been shown by all of the Alkira Community. I am thankful to participants, families, the board, staff, volunteers and our supporters for their contribution to Alkira and the part they play in ensuring we provide excellent support to participants. Hopefully, the coming year brings on even more positive stories as we slowly return to how things were.

Participant Committee Report

It has been a busy year for the Participant Committee with a mixture of online and in-person engagement activities, both among the members and with the community. The Participant Committee is made up of Alkira participants and supports self-advocacy and feedback provision to ensure quality service delivery at Alkira.

In the last financial year the Participant Committee has actively participated in 24 internal meetings and 10 VALID Eastern Region Self-Advocacy Network meetings. The meetings were aimed to promote speaking up on views and issues, and also served as a forum for issues or idea discussions. There have been many different topics throughout the year with the community including: 'About Disability Royal Commission' with Ms Bron Emmerson from Melbourne East Disability Advocacy, Community Access and Voluntary opportunities with Ms Maureen D'Arcy from Whitehorse City Council and Johana's Hospitality Project, which led to Johana's nomination as 'Student of the Year' at Box Hill Institute. Congratulations to Johana on this achievement.

International Day of People with Disability 2021

Members were pleased with the success in facilitating the celebration of International Day of People with Disability (IDPWD) online virtual event on December 3rd. The Committee received around 25 copies of IDPWD colouring templates, from which they selected three creative colouring winners. They happily celebrated the day with various activities i.e. Dialogues with CEO, Let's chat about our ability's videos, participants' volunteered performances, Kahoot games and dancing. The 2020-21 Committee members were presented the Certificate of Appreciation for their dedication and commitment to the Committee activities despite previous ongoing lockdown restrictions that affected the advocacy works.

Election of new members

Earlier this year the Participant Committee successfully completed a democratic election process, whereby 15 members were elected by Alkira participants from across Alkira: Thurston, Momentum, Networks, Skill Up with SLES, the Springfield Community Hub and our Home and Choice service.

With representatives from all the service groups of Alkira, the Participant Committee are well placed to represent the views and needs of all Alkira participants.

The 2022 Participant Committee Election process took 2 months to complete starting in February.

- Voting Day on March 28 with 92 votes received from participants across all of Alkira

Home Supports Report Meghan Coulter

What an incredible year it has been within Home Supports at Alkira. Together, we created opportunities to connect and participate in regular and milestone celebrations – all while navigating everyday life during the ongoing pandemic. We ensured residents were supported with exceptional, quality care by the Home Supports team, maintaining infection control protocols under the remaining rules for high-risk settings.

As mentioned by Laura, the health and disability industry has experienced sector wide staffing challenges which has meant that we all adapted and worked together as an Alkira team. Collaboration from the Community Supports team to fill in where needed has been advantageous and has encouraged opportunities for learning and growth, and we now have a range of shared experiences to link the Alkira services furthermore.

Staffing at each house remained as consistent as possible with many additional shifts, overtime and adapted rosters to ensure that the best care and support could be offered. The Home Supports team is to be congratulated on this remarkable commitment to Alkira's residents.

We have taken opportunities for growth from our experience in both responding to, and most importantly, preventing further covid outbreaks. Training, practice, resources and learning from different scenarios across houses has been vital. We supported residents and staff to gain their covid vaccinations, secured rapid antigen tests, complied with regular screening of staff and residents and ensured supply and use of full PPE. We made available our short term accommodation site as a location for isolation and this proved to be very effective way to isolate while providing a warm home environment with regular and familiar staff to support those affected.

Residents have been supported to make informed decisions about their own health and wellbeing amidst the pandemic. Those who tested positive had swift follow up with health care and processes to protect other residents and staff.

Supported Independent Living

This year has seen Home Supports broaden the opportunities for eligibility to apply for long term housing in an Alkira owned home. Vacancies were made available not only to participants who have Specialist Disability Accommodation (SDA) NDIS funding, but also to those participants without. This approach is unique and provided more equitable access to long term housing options for more participants with fewer limitations in the application process, further supporting Alkira's values.

We have had several families seeking future supported living options with Alkira and I am pleased to say we have an exciting project underway. We have been collaborating with a family to provide supported independent living to three new participants within a privately owned house. We look forward to updating the progress of this opportunity in next year's report and sharing with everyone the experiences that we all have in moving towards new opportunities at Alkira.

Renovations have taken place at Willandra with two bathroom renovations, and Riversdale and Perkins have new heating cooling systems installed. In addition, the two properties owned by the state government have been also undergoing capital improvements including painting, LED lighting, covered outdoor areas, roofing repairs, bathroom and laundry updates, path improvements and general external tidying.

Short Term Accommodation

Perkins House was not able to facilitate new bookings during lockdowns, so when there was opportunity to reopen this service; the bookings began to flow in steadily. It has become evident that participants, their carers and families are becoming increasingly comfortable with re-booking short term accommodation stays to have a break away from the family home. It has been a breath of fresh air to see new and existing participants accessing opportunities to stay with peers and friends, increase their independence and step out of the smaller world that covid has created for many people.





It has been a year to celebrate the success as we supported residents to continue to live a life motivated by choice and goal achievement. Staff have worked extremely hard, often wearing face shields, masks and at times gowns; supporting residents with and without covid to maintain a safe and comfortable living environment.

I extend a very big thank you to the Home Supports team and those of Community Supports who stepped up and out of their comfort zone. The dedication that shines through our wonderful team of workers is obvious and it is a privilege to manage a team of such flexible individuals.

Community Supports Report Steven Parkinson

The last year has included some big topics - federal elections, social changes, another NDIS restructure, fire and floods - and the list keeps going.

Our Community Supports Team have navigated their way through all of this and still managed to run a fantastic service that we can and should all be proud of. The management and staff teams have worked together to provide the best possible outcomes for our participants and each other, and I'm very pleased to give you an update.

Unlike other sectors, disability is still constrained by DHHS and the NDIS. Obviously Covid continues to be a thorn in our side, however using innovation and good practice, we've managed to return to some sort of Covid normal. Influenza and Respiratory Syncytial Viral infections have contributed to our difficulties, however, our staff and participants have been vigilant in keeping themselves and each other safe. We continue to be fluent in managing our 'bubbles' across and inside different sites as infection rates ebb and flow in the community. It is commendable how adaptable our staff and participants have become throughout the last year.

School Leavers Employment Support (SLES)

Our SLES program focuses on classroom and industry-based workplace learning. This includes industry workplace visits to learn about the different types of jobs. We are seeing students explore and reflect on their employment goals while they are learning in both the hands on and theory based sessions. As part of the program students prepare for their pathway - whether that be tertiary studies, a Disability Employment Service, open employment or online courses.

Now that we are in our Covid normal we are looking to improve and grow this service with real retail experience options.

Momentum and Networks at Box Hill Institute

Students continue to grow their independence, maturity levels, qualifications and life skills. It's been a joy to see such a large cohort graduate at Box Hill Institute (RTO Code:4687) again and grow meaningful relationships with each other - offering genuine support to each other.

This cohort grew significantly last year with another 21 students starting with us in 2022. Our reputation amongst the special schools in our service area is an excellent one with a large number of referrals as our service offering is unique and of proven quality.

Connections at Thurston St

Our Connections program at our Thurston St site deserves special acknowledgment and gratitude for managing the brunt of the impacts of the changes that have occurred over the last 12 months at Alkira.

Thurston St has been in a very unique and challenging position, and they took on the responsibility of managing our day to day staffing challenges across all of our Community Supports sites, and often, our Home Supports services.

All of Alkira has benefited greatly from the professionalism, resilience, positivity, high standards and incredible work ethic displayed by our staff at Thurston St. Furthermore, our participants continue to be productive and grow alongside our staff who have demonstrated innovation and flexibility on a daily basis, whilst remaining cognisant of their real goal.





Connections at the Springfield Community Hub

The Springfield Community Hub remains one of Alkira's crown jewels. Our participants here are flourishing in our state-of-the-art facility and modifications have been made to our program delivery to make our services even better. Our participants regularly report being very happy here and our staff do an excellent job in maintaining and increasing the skill sets of our participants with a particular focus on independence. We are hopeful that moving into the future, we will also be able to provide therapeutic intervention on-site here, as that seems to be an interest of many participants.

Work Experience and Training

Independent Me is a program that provides 1:1 support in the workplace during work experience placements. Support is provided until it is no longer needed with the goal of finding long term, mainstream, meaningful employment for our participants. Our results speak for themselves with 10 participants already placed in employment in the last few months alone - truly epic given our constraints. We anticipate that this area will grow significantly. We have known for some time that many of our participants' main goal is to find employment so watch this space.

Our Community Support Team's performance has been nothing short of excellent. I'd like to thank each and every member of our team for going so much further than we ever thought we would need you to. You are all truly assets to Alkira and to our participants. I don't want to speak too soon, but it seems as though we may finally be moving forward after a difficult couple of years and it is because of the dedication and hard work of our team.

Support Coordination Report

Support Coordination is a service which assists people with a disability to negotiate and understand their NDIS package and maximise its use. Support Coordination at Alkira has grown, comparing the last year to the year prior we have doubled our hours of service. This is such an achievement as we aim to support more and more people to ensure they receive the services and supports of their choice and get the most out of their NDIS Plan.

Some of their success stories from the last 12 months include:



A participant received funding for a new custom-built electric wheelchair to suit his requirements, and other special equipment to increase his independence.



After a long period of negotiation with several agencies, a participant finally received additional funds for shortterm accommodation and Support Coordination.



A participant was assisted to move into his own apartment with a car space for his car. He is receiving 1:1 supports to assist with independent living skills, and has reported to everyone how happy he is living in his own home.

Helen received funding for a new automatic high/low bed to assist her in and out of bed.



Multiple participants have moved into supported accommodation, or a household which better suits their needs and requirements.

Business Systems Report Ben Moodie

Over the last year Covid has delivered challenges however we have taken this opportunity to work on enhancing our IT systems. We have finalised the implementation of our payroll award interpreter, this has allowed us to pay staff more efficiently with this automation saving us time but still ensuring accuracy of remuneration.

We have continued to work on ensuring the Alkira team have access to information when and where they need it. This has been underpinned by Alkira's strategy to move to cloud-based storage. During lockdown periods the team worked on providing the infrastructure required for service delivery.

This included ensuring back of house was supported as well as providing online support services to our participants.

We are investigating replacement of our core records system and this will continue and be finalised next year. This will benefit us by ensuring information is available on different devices in various locations and will further streamline our onboarding, rostering and billing processes.

I would like to thank all members of the Business Systems & Finance team for all their hard work and dedication and look forward to working together next year.


Mid-cycle Audit

Our mid-cycle review against the NDIS Disability standards was completed in May 2022. We hosted the auditors for two days who met with participants and staff, and reviewed our documentation. At the end of the two days the auditors were greatly impressed with the relationships between participants and staff, how everyone interacts, the support and services provided and the way we aim to improve and provide quality services. They made a couple of minor suggestions for improvement which we are working towards.

Improvement Matters

We ran our "Improvement Matters" campaign to encourage and attract suggestions from participants, staff and others so we can continually improve things. There are no suggestions too big or too small - this year we have received 85 suggestions from the Alkira community, for example:





Annual Satisfaction Survey

Quality is a measurement of how good something is, but also whether it meets its purpose. Therefore, quality disability services need to be safe, effective and meeting a person's needs or expectations.

A way to measure this, is by asking those who participate at Alkira whether we are meeting their expectations, are effective and whether they feel safe. In 2021, we remodeled our annual participant satisfaction survey to gauge whether we were meeting participants' expectations in certain aspects of our services. The results were very pleasing and assured us we are providing quality services which are safe, effective and meeting expectations. The results showed that in six of the nine areas we met or exceeded their expectations more than 80% of the time - the areas were in planning, friendliness, support, community access, privacy and safety. The three areas that we will be making improvements in are for choices, feedback and opportunities.



Treasurer's Report Brent Sheers

It is my pleasure to present the Financial Statements and the Treasurer's report for Alkira for the 30 June 2022 financial year. Firstly I would like to thank my predecessor, Peter Holdsworth for his time, efforts and most importantly his guidance as I take on the Treasurer role going forward. I would also like to extend my thanks to the Board, senior management team and greater Alkira community for welcoming me into the organisation over the past year.

As I write this, we are now in the midst of what is considered to be Covid normal, but this has not stopped the pandemic for continuing to significantly impact Alkira over the past 12 months. Unfortunately, lockdowns throughout the first half of the financial year saw Community Supports services adversely effected with Alkira not being able to offer our full suite of services. Despite this impact the senior management team and staff worked tirelessly throughout this period and I cannot thank them enough.

I would also like to thank every individual person and organisation who donated to one of many important causes. The Alkira community and their selflessness is what helps us deliver Alkira's goals.

We look forward to using the 30 June 2022 year as a platform for the organisation to get back to running at pre-pandemic levels and delivering both a full suite of service offerings and making a profit without the use of government subsidies such as JobKeeper.

2022 Operating Performance

With the cessation of JobKeeper in March 2021, and further lockdowns in the first half of the financial year, Alkira made the conscious effort to ensure that despite the reduction in service offerings it was important that we retained staff. This became the key driver in making what became a net operating loss of \$803,720 (2021: loss of \$2,986,008) and a total comprehensive loss of \$527,308 (2021: profit of \$1,524,510).

The significant amount of JobKeeper and government stimulus that drove the 2021 profit, has been utilised in 2022 for this purpose to help ensure we had the staff to increase service offerings once we came out of lockdown.

Operating revenue increased by \$2,375,806 (24%) on the back of Community Supports offerings increasing in the second half of the financial year.

Operating expenditure increased by \$193,518 (1%) mainly due to salaries, rent and outgoing increasing year on year, however management have done a fantastic job in stabilising our expenditure during the lockdown period.

Donations and grants represented \$201,003 (73%) of our non-operating revenue and is an area that will be of continual focus going forward into the 2023 financial year.

In spite of the tough operating conditions across the Not-for-Profit sector during the year, Alkira has managed to maintain a strong balance sheet. Whilst net assets have decreased by \$527,308 (4%), our working capital at year-end remains extremely positive in a surplus position of \$6,250,499.

Our strong working capital and liquidity is due to Alkira's strong historical cash surplus at year end of \$6,810,267.


Moving forward to the year ahead
